NEW VENUE

Two years ago we were happily using rooms at The Cedar Centre. Then USQ resumed control of their premises and all community groups had to find new venues. David and I spent many hours researching and visiting potential new venue at that time and after many roadblocks, eventually secured a room at the TAFE.

While this room did not suit everyone, it met most of our requirements. Dealing with TAFE was a complicated business, however we persevered and many of our classes were held there over the last two years.

Our contract with TAFE ended in June and due to renovations they are unable to offer us a further contract for 2018/19. So the search for a new venue resumed and we are now happy to advise that from third term we have a contract for use of **a room** at Seventh Day Adventist Church Complex (SDA) at 669 Greenwattle Street, Glenvale.

Only the classes that were held at TAFE will switch to SDA. The Tutors involved will be given a site visit during the holidays and we anticipate that, while some settling in may occur, the move will proceed smoothly. This venue has ample off-street parking which can (if you choose the lower parking area) be closer to the room, is all on one level, and will offer a quieter environment.

The use of this room will be controlled by U3A, just as the TAFE has been. The classes already using SDA will still make their own arrangements as they have been doing.

The Management Committee endeavor at all times to look at "the big picture" when making decisions and we appreciate your support on this and all management matters.

A very warm thank you to all those wonderful people who joined our classes. If you have particular requests for next year please give me a ring. Will see what can be organised.


