#### FROM TOOWOOMBA TO CHINA

Nine intrepid Toowoomba U3A members joined the inaugural U3A International Study Tour to China and enjoyed a learning experience not found in day to day U3A Course offerings.

International U3A Study Tours is a joint initiative between Association of International Universities of the Third Age (AIUTA) and Chinese Association of Universities of the Aged (CAUA). This inaugural tour hosted 170 U3A members from 10 countries. The opportunity to meet and mingle and learn first-hand of the countries of others and their cultures opens doors to greater understanding. Personal encounters teach us that "different and diverse" is what makes the world an interesting destination.

From Trish: "We had a great time and we have made lifelong memories and lifelong friends. One such new friend is planning a trip to Australia later this year, so we can catch up".

From Tom: "It was very clear from our itinerary before we left that it was an incredibly full programme. An immense amount of work and effort was put into creating a wonderfully varied coverage of important tourist highlights. What we covered was like a taste, a sample of what could be expanded on if you wanted to travel again later by yourself. The wonderful insight our guides gave us on what we really came to "study", the thousands of years of culture, encapsulated in a few days was really nothing short of amazing. If we haven't come away from this tour greatly enlightened it's no ones' fault but our own. The lingering memories will be the wonderful things we saw."

It was unanimously agreed that the interaction with members of several Chinese U3As visited was the highlight of the tour. The generous and warmhearted welcome, the invitation to participate in classes, such as calligraphy, tai chi, paper cutting and ballroom dance to name a few, showed that regardless of nationality, U3A joins seniors in an instantaneous bond of friendship and connectivity.

Future Study Tours will be offered in China, Japan, India, France, Portugal, Austria, Slovakia, Bulgaria, Poland, Czech Republic, Columbia, Mexico, Tunisia and of course Australia.

International Study Tours open up a whole new learning experience to U3A members worldwide.

#### **KNOW YOUR COMMITTEE — SUE DOYLE**



Sue has been a member of U3A for about five years. Initially she was a life guard for the swimming/aqua class one day a week, which over time has resulted in her taking the aqua class twice a week. She also coordinates the Monday afternoon tennis group and is looking forward to becoming more involved now she has joined the committee.

Sue grew up in Manchester in the U.K. and started swimming lessons at the age of nine. By 12 years of age she was on the city team and somewhere has a certificate that says she is a 'Lancashire Champion'. Sue also played in two brass bands, starting on trombone, then moving to baritone and finally tenor horn. At 18, Sue left home to train as a nurse in Bristol. After working in Chichester, Aberdeen and Manchester, and having along the way acquired a husband and two children, the family moved to Australia in 1987. The first stop was Campbelltown, Sydney, then Wollongong where they gained a daughter, followed by Wodonga, and finally Toowoomba in 1994. Sue was a stay-at-home mum until her youngest left school, when her daughter arranged for Sue to take her part-time job as a swimming teacher, ("go do the course mum, you start next term"). She carried out this job for six years before retiring.

Over the years, Sue has been on several committees commencing at the age of 16 when she was the junior representative on the committee of Denton Brass Band. She served on the P & C at a very small school in Talgarno in Victoria before they moved the children to a bigger school. Next came the Toowoomba Choral Society Youth Choir where she was registrar for four years, followed by registration and nomination secretary for The Glennie Swimming Club, which lasted for nine years. Sue was also responsible for the computer programming and electronic timing system for swimming carnivals held at The Glennie Pool.

Outside of U3A, Sue's hobbies are tennis (which she plays up to five times per week), cross stitch, listening to audio books and trivia. She has a four legged exercise machine called Dougie who takes her for a walk every day, and two grandchildren in Ipswich she babysits fairly regularly and who leave her exhausted. By far her most expensive hobby is travel. She loves seeing new places and recently returned from the U3A study tour to China.

#### **KNOW YOUR COMMITTEE — PETER ROBINSON**



Peter was born in Rockhampton, Queensland in 1954. The family lived there, then in Darwin, finally settling in Ashgrove, Brisbane in 1962. Peter and his three brothers were educated at Marist Brothers College in Ashgrove.

The outdoors was a big part of his younger years and he was involved in the scouting movement from the age of eight to 17, also doing a couple of stints as a cub and scout leader. Many weekends were spent under canvas on hikes and camps, with many family camping holidays either at the beach or in the bush. Peter's camping and hiking continued with friends - Granite Belt, Main Range NP, Lamington Plateau and various other places.

After leaving school Peter worked at the Royal Brisbane Hospital as a clerk for a couple of years. He then took up an apprenticeship as a Fitter (Diesel and Heavy Earthmoving Equipment) and worked at this for a number of years before he was offered a position as a trade teacher with TAFE. He did two years of teacher training in Brisbane and then transferred to Toowoomba TAFE College where he taught for 28 years and studied part time to complete a

Bachelor of Education. Peter retired from teaching in 2013 but didn't think much of retirement so found a job at Bunnings West Toowoomba and spent five years in the Tools Section, finally retiring in 2018.

Peter met his wife, Pam, in Brisbane. They married in 1977 and have two children, a daughter and a son, who now live respectively in Brisbane and the Sunshine Coast. They have four grandchildren, two boys and two girls, aged between 10 years and 16 months.

Raising their two children saw Peter involved in coaching their son's baseball team from under 8s to under 20s, with the team reasonably successful in a tough Brisbane competition. He even played a little himself in master's teams at the PanPac Masters Games on the Gold Coast and the Australian Masters in Adelaide. He was involved in taking their daughter to speech and drama events and eisteddfods in Toowoomba and Brisbane. Along with all of that, Peter built their house on 92 acres at Upper Flagstone Creek where they lived for about ten years.

When the children began to grow up and go their own way Peter rekindled his interest in bushwalking and the great outdoors. He joined the Toowoomba Bushwalking Club and enjoyed many day and weekend hikes. An interest in some extended hikes by some members led to the organising of multi day (10 days) hikes in the Snowy Mountains, New Zealand and the Blue Mountains. Peter's wife shares many day walks with him but draws the line at carrying 15 -20kg packs over large distances and camping in little one and two man tents.

Peter and his wife love being outdoors and walking and are only too happy to share their experience with whoever wants to join them.

#### KNOW YOUR COMMITTEE—COLLEEN TAYLOR

Colleen has been a bit of a wanderer. She was born in Tasmania and spent her school years in New South Wales. The 1970s found her living and working in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea both before and after Independence. She has very fond memories of her time there and of the people so it was a great opportunity for her to go on a cruise to Papua New Guinea in recent years, visiting Rabaul where her sister and her family had lived and which was virtually obliterated by ash from the volcanic eruption in 1994.

From her savings working in Papua New Guinea, Colleen lived the Aussie traveller's dream of a working holiday in England. Her mother and her family were from England so there was a lot of catching up with family. At that time, it was

cheaper to holiday abroad compared to living in London so Colleen experienced a lot of travel to escape the English winter – Europe, Israel and Egypt. Then she fulfilled her dream of overland travel (with a group) to South America and then through Africa before the funds ran out. Colleen expected to return to Australia, save money and head off again as soon as possible. Alas, life got in the way and after a couple of interesting office jobs, she joined the Public Service. Thirty-two years later, she retired and now gets to do more travelling, although the idea of a cruise ship is as adventurous as she can manage. She and her sister have now been to China and Russia in one trip then a cruise around the Mediterranean and Greek Isles.

Colleen moved to Toowoomba after retirement. The climate suits her and the size of the city is a nice fit. She now looks forward to compiling the family history in between occasional travel, as well as some of the many and varied classes offered by U3A. She said that she is very happy to have been accepted so warmly into the University of the Third Age family in Toowoomba.
